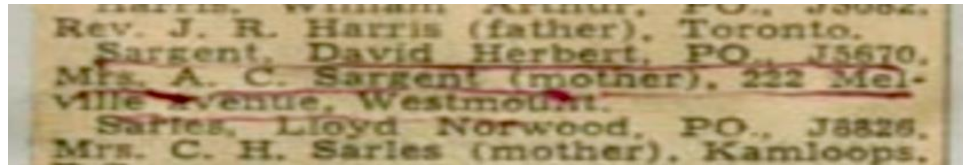
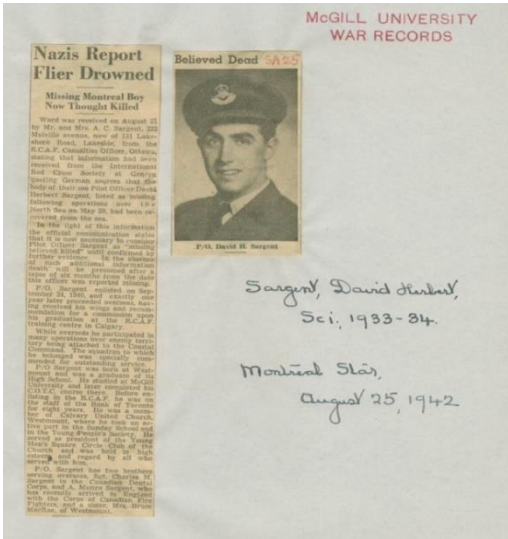

Pilot Officer Sargent's Body Recovered in Sea

The body of Pilot Officer David H. Sargent of Montreal, well known in Ottawa, has been recovered from the North Sea, according to information received by his parents from the Department of National Defence. The report was forwarded from the International Red Cross Society at Geneva which quoted a German report of the finding of the body.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Sargent of Montreal, the late pilot officer was well acquainted in Ottawa. He was listed as missing following air operations over the North Sea on May 29. Attached to the coastal command he participated in many operations over enemy territory. His squadron was commended for outstanding service.

Born in Westmount, the young flier was educated there and studied at McGill University. He was a former employe of the Bank of Toronto.

David Herbert Sargent was born in Montreal Quebec and graduated from Westmount High School in 1933.

David Sargent wrote in his yearbook that his ambition was to get a higher level of education. His friends used to call him Sarge and his favorite expression was Eh. Furthermore, he played bolo ball in his free time and played basketball and bolo ball as school activities.

He went to McGill University and worked at the bank of Toronto before going to fight in the war.

His mother's name was Catherine Munro Sargent and his father's name was Arthur Charles Sargent.

He was a flying officer and a pilot of the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF).

His squadron was honored for their service.

Sargent's body was declared missing on May 29, 1942 at the age of 26 and his body was later found in the North Sea.

His family was told about his death by the department of national defense.

David Herbert Sargent is buried at Runnymede Memorial in Surrey United kingdom at panel 99. Runnymede Memorial is dedicated to soldiers in air force who lost their lives during World War Two.
